Every year the James O’Sullivan Award is given by the Australian Bridge Association to the player, in each of the masterpoint categories, who achieves the most masterpoints for the year. It is a nationwide award, recognising players from across Australia.

The winner of the 2018 James O’Sullivan Award, for gaining the most masterpoints in the Club Masters category, was TBC member Aijun Yang.

Aijun hasn’t stopped there and is continuing to successfully accrue masterpoints. She was recently promoted to State* Master.



TBC members also achieving good results in their Bridge were Ming Shu Yang and Gill Phillippo, who teamed with Eugene Pereira and Rex Meadowcroft, to win the Restricted Teams event at the gold point Barrier Reef Congress held in Cairns.

The team were the lowest ranked team in the event but went on to win seven, and draw one match, of the eight match contest.

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Club House

As part of the club's 'green drive' to become more sustainable, investigations are underway to assess the feasibility of installing a large water storage tank on the south wall of the club, to collect and recycle rainwater from the roof catchment. This would reduce reliance on mains water for toilet flushing. The proposal to install a tank raised some issues regarding the club's lease with the Brisbane City Council that required Council co-operation before proceeding.

Cr Peter Matic recently visited the club and expressed support for the club's application for collecting roof water for the toilet flushing and garden watering. Cr Matic visited the club a second time with member of a Brisbane City Council committee involved in the move to make community clubs more sustainable, provided advice and assistance to TBC in lodging the application to install a rain water tank.

Brisbane City Council has now given written approval to proceed with the installation of the rainwater tank. The TBC committee is now seeking a grant to assist fund the installation.

The installation of a water tank for recycling water, along with the solar panels, and our waste recycling programme, makes TBC a highly sustainable club.

Club Rooms

An internal paint job for the club has been given the go ahead. An interior decorator friend of club member Yolande Coroneo inspected the rooms and recommended a colour scheme. After wide discussion and feedback from members, a new internal paint colour scheme has now been agreed.

The work will get underway shortly. It will take about ten days to complete. The plan is to have the work organised in such a way as to avoid disruption to the busy operation of the club. Nevertheless, members will need to be a little patient during the process.

The club should look pretty spruce when it is completed.

Success of Mentoring

Bridge is a partnership game, but it's in defence that your partnership cooperation is really put to the test, and rewarded when it works. It's surprising how much your scores improve if you get good at maximising your tricks on defence; it's half the game after all.

Hopefully the Thursday evening mentoring programme will help many of our improving players with these skills. These hands show how you can figure out who has what, provided that your partnership follows the rules.

Making Deductions

Raelene Clark and I were putting our mentor/mentee teamwork into practice. In the following hand I was North with Raelene sitting South, and our opposition reached 3D by West after we'd overcalled and raised hearts. It was

Although hearts were partner's suit, I avoided leading the unsupported ace in case there was a king on my right. Instead I led the 8S and the trick went small, jack, queen. Declarer tried a trump to the king and Raelene's ace. She duly sent me a heart, which I won. What could I tell about the spades? I saw four in dummy and five in my hand, and the J and Q had gone. Who had the 10? The ace?

A well-behaved mentee holding the 10 and jack would have followed with the 10. When following you should play the lowest of equal cards that can do the job. Therefore I confidently concluded declarer had the 10. The ace is trickier to place - partner could have risked "finessing dummy", playing the jack in order to keep the ace sitting over the king. It didn't matter though, leading another spade was safe either way, and on the day it got us a ruff, to partner's mild surprise.

We'd done the best we could, holding the bad guys to 9 tricks, and the key was that I "knew" what partner had denied holding in the spades.


